State Parks offers free permits to caregivers

Thanks to the generosity of Lt. Gov. Billy Nungesser and the <u>Office of State Parks</u>, all certified foster caregivers and relative/kin caregivers can receive a permit good for free admission to any park in Louisiana for one year!

With your permit, everyone in your vehicle/ group will be allowed in at no charge. You can enjoy boating, hiking, fishing, golf and much more as you explore the beauty of Louisiana.

For caregivers with a child in a wheelchair, there are <u>all-terrain track wheelchairs</u> now available at eight of the State Parks. They are electric-powered and can be used on designated park trails not suitable for regular wheelchairs. Please note that these wheelchairs need to be reserved and, if possible, you should bring your own helmet and eye protection https://www.lastateparks.com/about_state_pa rks/foster_caregiver_permit. That includes uploading a photo of your foster care certification card. For relative/kin caregivers, you



will be mailed a card you can use for the form.

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If you need an updated card, please reach out to your regional recruiter. You can find the full list on the Foster Caregiver Resources webpage.

State Parks will begin mailing permits in mid-January to those who have completed the online form and uploaded their card. Once you receive your

permit, it will be good for one year. If you have questions or issues with the form, please call the Office of State Parks at 225-342-8111.

Free online tutoring and academic resources offered through HomeworkLouisiana

HomeworkLouisiana is a free service that provides academic tutoring for students from kindergarten through 12th grade, help preparing for standardized tests (including the ACT and SAT), and job search assistance for adults.

Kindergarten students through adult learners can get help in English, math, reading, science, social studies, Spanish and writing from an ondemand tutor. The job search assistance is oneon-one, real-time support for an online tutor. All of the services can be accessed from a home computer, a mobile device, or from a Louisiana public library. 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Foster Care Advisory Board kicks off in Monroe

The Foster Care Advisory Board has recently relaunched and will hold regional and statewide meetings in 2025.

While the Foster Care Community Collaboratives focus on foster needs that the community can meet, the Advisory Board will address policy and procedure issues and improving communication between foster caregivers and the agency. Regional meetings will focus on local needs and working together to find solutions. Regional caregivers will elect representatives to the statewide Advisory Board, which will meet quarterly and look at statewide needs.

The first regional Advisory Board meeting was held in Monroe on Nov. 20. Be on the lookout for an invitation to your regional meeting in 2025.

CASA and DCFS: Working Together for Children

Our agency has been working to strengthen our relationship with the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) Associations across the state. Appointed by the court, CASA volunteers work to ensure that children in the Child Welfare system find safe, permanent homes. The role of a CASA is to serve as an independent advocate for one child or sibling group, allowing them time to give their full attention and support to that one child or sibling group. CASA volunteers submit detailed court reports to the court and all relevant parties involved in a case.

New support group helps biological children in foster families

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Hanna Beth Nielsen grew up as a biological child in a family that took in foster children. Based on her experience and the needs she's seen, she created Siblings Supporting Siblings. The organization is for biological children in foster and/or adoptive families to empower and support them.

Siblings Supporting Siblings holds support groups for children ages 12 to 17 and covers topics such as grief, how to use your voice, and other topics related to foster care. The groups are not meeting during the holidays, but will resume in 2025.
