## More regional Community Collaboratives begin

With the start of the new year has come more regional Meet & Greets with Sec. Matlock and foster caregivers, and Foster Care Community Collaboratives will soon begin in the Covington and Lafayette regions.

The collaborative meetings bring together foster caregivers, community partners and DCFS staff members to learn about and meet caregivers' needs. They began with a group in Shreveport and, since the beginning of 2024, have expanded to the Baton Rouge, Thibodaux, Monroe, Alexandria, and Covington regions. Covington will hold its first Community Collaborative on March 19. Lafayette Region foster caregivers will have the chance to meet with Sec. Matlock on Friday, April 4, and should form their collaborative soon after. The goal is to have these community-driven meetings in all nine regions of the state by the end of this year.

# Get to Know Your Trainer: Lisa Kaichen

As a certified foster parent, you've probably been trained by Lisa Kaichen through the Louisiana Child Welfare Training Academy (LCWTA). Lisa has a long history in the social work field and passion for the work that shines through each session she does. Here's a little bit more of her story.

Lisa's first professional social work job was in 1974 as the Executive Director of the Sanctuary, a shelter and counseling program for runaway youth in Michigan. It was there that she learned about the realities of teens who experienced sexual abuse, bullying at school, or who spent time in and out of behavioral health facilities.

From there, she became director of Children's Charter of the Courts of Michigan, a statewide children's advocacy program. She got involved with Prevent Child Abuse America and Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), both of which were brand new in the early 1980s. Lisa chaired the Coleman Commission on Permanency Planning, organized the first national conference

on permanency planning, and was asked to set up one of the first Children's Trust Funds in the nation.

Her work inspired her to become a mom through adoption in 1988, to a five-year-old named Angela. Lisa was one of the first single parents allowed to adopt a pre-school aged child. In the early 90s she married, had another daughter, Erika, and moved to Louisiana. *continued on page 3*

- <u>Homework Louisiana</u> provides free academic tutoring for students from kindergarten through 12th grade, help preparing for standardized tests (including the ACT and SAT), and job search assistance for adults.

Without a local support system, Lisa reached out to the Parenting Center of West St. Tammany, who hired her to write a proposal to develop a First Steps Program in two local hospitals. In partnership with Prevent Child Abuse Louisiana, the program began, with volunteers visiting new moms in the hospital to find out how they

were doing and what they needed and to offer resources. Lisa also developed a Mentor Moms Program.

Lisa started her consulting firm, ResourceWorks, in 1990. She provided start-up consulting for a children's

advocacy and forensic interviewing program in Covington that is now Hope House, as well as an early Head Start Program near Covington High School.

Through much of the 1990s Lisa contracted with DCFS to provide in-service training for foster and adoptive parents. In the mid-90s she worked with Susan Shaffette to develop the St. Tammany Commission on Families, the State Plans for Child Abuse Prevention for the Louisiana Children's Trust Fund, and the Together We Can

Conference. She also taught at the University of New Orleans and the Tulane School of Social Work.

Over the last four years, Lisa has developed courses and served as a trainer for the LCWTA. She says that this work feels like going home. "I love learning from other adults with decades of experience as foster parents. I

love supporting people who have such great impact on the lives and future of children," Lisa said.

Lisa's younger daughter, Erika Brady Henderson, LMSW, now co-leads foster parent training with her. Erika is also an equine assisted therapist working with

children who have experienced trauma. As Lisa approaches 50 years in the field, she is pouring into Erika as her legacy, hoping that foster caregiver training classes will carry on far into the future.

Some of the LCWTA upcoming sessions to be led by Lisa and Erika include, *Raising Good Humans, Art that Builds Self-Esteem, School-Age Child Development,* and *Lifebooks that Heal.*
