Louisiana's SNAP benefits schedule is changing!



DCFS is changing the SNAP benefits schedule to distribute benefits more evenly throughout each month. The transition begins in December 2020, and the new regular schedule becomes permanent in **February 2021**.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Starting in December, your benefits may be loaded onto your EBT card on a different day of the month than you're used to.
- If any household member is classified as disabled, or if the head of the household is 60 years old or older, you will continue to get your benefits on the 1st 4th of each month.
- The chart below tracks when your SNAP benefits will be loaded onto your EBT card.
- No recipient will go more than 40 days between benefit issuances.

SNAP NON-DISCRIMINATION STATEMENT
